
All 120 KY Counties Now in RED Zone

(<u>KYCOVID19.KY.GOV</u>) There were 4,849 new cases recorded today, with 1,518 of the other cases in patients 18 and under. There were 65 new deaths, bringing the total up to 7,640. *The positivity rate is now up to* 13.16%. (According to a <u>social media post</u> by the Governor, this is the highest it has been since the pandemic began. He termed today's report as "heart breaking".)

There are 2,074 patients currently hospitalized with COVID, with 540 in the ICU and 338 on a ventilator. Statewide, 71.8% of the ICU beds are occupied. FIVE regions of the state have ICU capacity in-use over 80%:

- ➤ Region 1 (Far western KY) 84.31%
- ➤ Region 4 (Bowling Green/Barren River area) 86.11%
- ➤ Region 7 (Gateway area) 80.52%
- ➤ Region 8 (Far eastern KY) 86.76%
- Region 10 (Somerset/SC KY area) 82.55%

Clay County is still leading the state with an incidence rate of 245.5 per 100,000 people.

'Alarming' Number of Pregnant Women Admitted to Alabama ICUs

The trend points to just how important it is for pregnant women to get vaccinated, physicians say

(MedPage Today) Physicians from the division of maternal-fetal medicine at the University of Alabama at Birmingham (UAB) recently reported that 39 pregnant women with COVID-19 had been admitted to their hospital over the month of August. Of this group, 10 were admitted to the ICU and seven are currently on ventilators.

Tragedy at Zoneton Fire Department could lead to change in Kentucky law

(WDRB) A Kentucky lawmaker plans to file a bill that would help the families of first responders who died from COVID-19. Rep. Thomas Huff, a Republican from Shepherdsville, said his proposal is a result of the twin tragedy that occurred at the Zoneton Fire Department.

Chief Rob Orkies <u>died in December 2020</u> after a battle with both cancer and COVID-19. Then in February, acting Chief Gary Key also fell to the virus. But the families were denied Kentucky's death benefit of \$80,000 given when first responders die as a result of their jobs.

Zoneton's new chief, Kevin Moulton, said he was told by the Kentucky Fire Commission that the families were not eligible because of the way the state law is worded. Huff's bill would change that, adding the virus to the causes of death that are eligible for the first responder death benefit.

Drugs Increasingly Killing Young Kentuckians In Pandemic

(WFPL) Young Kentuckians experienced the highest increase in drug overdose deaths last year, according to the state's overdose fatality report released this month. The report showed increases in mortality across all age groups, and overdose deaths grew overall by 49%. But the jump for young people was much higher: 127 people aged 15-24, 90% more overdose deaths than the previous year.

Total overdose rates had been climbing steadily over the last decade, increasing by 95% since 2010. But by 2018, those numbers were starting to trend down — at least until 2020 hit. The exact cause of the increase is unclear, but it's possible that young people may be dealing with unique challenges during the pandemic.

State records show that over the last five years, increases or decreases in overdose deaths have correlated with the number of people reaching out for help and seeking emergency care. But in 2020, emergency admissions didn't keep pace.

In 2020, emergency department visits for nonfatal drug overdoses increased statewide by just 13%, compared to the 49% increase in total overdose deaths, <u>according to the Kentucky Injury Prevention and Research Center</u>. For young people, the discrepancy is even wider — emergency room visits increased by 10.5% while overdose deaths jumped by 90%. Hurricane center watches 3 new potential storms

(Click Orlando, August 25) A broad area of low pressure is expected to form over the western Caribbean Sea in a couple of days from a tropical wave currently located over the central Caribbean Sea. Federal, Local Law Enforcement Grapple with Recovery Of Human Remains As Migrant Deaths Surge

The New York Times (8/24, Romero) reports that "as the number of migrants crossing the border with Mexico has surged this year" to levels "not seen in more than two decades, so, too, has the number of bodies found by U.S. Customs and Border Protection" and other law enforcement agencies. Through July, "Border Patrol officials found 383 dead migrants, the highest toll in nearly a decade, and one already far surpassing the 253 recovered in the previous fiscal year." The Times also profiles the experience of Sheriff Oscar Carrillo of Culberson County in West Texas, who has also faced a rise in body discoveries. The Times says Carrillo "has found the bodies of 19 migrants this year, many who died because of the sweltering summer heat, up from two last year."

People who might qualify for humanitarian parole include women leaders, journalists and others from high-risk groups. < Read more >

5G networks need to be interoperable, DOD and DHS officials say

As military and civilian agencies eye the use of <u>fifth generation</u> wireless tech, officials representing both agree that a key to success is ensuring interoperability between networks and devices through open standards.

So far, the <u>Department of Defense</u> has led the government's effort to trial 5G by offering its bases to telecommunications companies as <u>testing grounds for the tech</u>. Those tests could yield new capabilities for both military operations and civilian uses, hence the need officials see to ensure the tech remains open and interoperable for agencies beyond DOD, officials said Tuesday at FedScoop's FedTalks conference.

"Cross-communications and interoperability absolutely will be critical for all our operators," Kathryn Coulter Mitchell, acting undersecretary for science and technology at the <u>Department of Homeland Security</u>, said of 5G technology.

Early versions of telecommunications networks lacked the ability for devices to be used across different companies' networks. That's a scenario officials want to avoid and urged both government officials and private sector companies to work together to ensure open standards.

THE SHIPPING CRISIS IS GETTING WORSE

Date: 23-Aug-21 **Source:** CNN **Summary:** The vast network of ports, container vessels and trucking companies that moves goods around the world is badly tangled, and the cost of shipping is skyrocketing. That's troubling news for retailers and holiday shoppers. More than 18 months into the pandemic, the disruption to global supply chains is getting worse, spurring shortages of consumer products and making it more expensive for companies to ship goods where they're needed. The latest obstacle is in China, where a terminal at the Ningbo-Zhoushan Port south of Shanghai has been shut since August 11 after a dock worker tested positive for Covid-19. Major international shipping lines, including Maersk (AMKBY), Hapag-Lloyd (HPGLY) and CMA CGM have adjusted schedules to avoid the port and are warning customers of delays.
